The table below gives links to the relevant sections of the text reporting Socrates' views translated into English; the right hand column gives a brief interpretation of the original, translated text.

Note: You may find the option to *chunk* the text into pages easier to read than the default *section* option. The option is available on the Perseus page on the lower left when I last looked. You will have to set it each time you look at a new section.

Paragraph	Gist of the text
Protagoras 355b	There is no need to proliferate terms; two are sufficient.
Protagoras 356a , Protagoras 356b , Protagoras 356c	Pleasures and pains can be given a degree, aggregated and compared.
Protagoras 356d , Protagoras 356e	Measurement is the way to carry out evaluations.
Protagoras 357a	The art of measurement is a form of knowledge: however in this dialogue the topic of measurement is not pursued and the reader is left to wonder how the measurement is to be done.
Protagoras 358a	Pleasure and pain are linked to good and bad
Protagoras 358c , Protagoras 358d	People will always choose the lesser of two evils
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
