# Y156: Understanding children Meet the Family



Daisy and Ryan live with their mum, Jodie, and her partner, Eamon. Jodie divorced Ryan's and Daisy's father when Ryan was 18 months old. It was a reasonably amicable separation. Graham lives about 30 miles away and maintains contact by telephone and regular weekend visits with Daisy and Ryan. He also regularly visits Rosalind, often taking all three children!

Jodie and Eamon have decided not to marry. Eamon has a close relationship with the children and plays a significant role in their care as he works shifts. Mia is Jodie's and Eamon's daughter and her birth has further cemented their relationship. Jodie returned to work part-time when Mia was five months old. Mia's care is shared between Jodie's parents (Michael and Grace), Eamon and Jodie. Michael and Grace are very involved in their grandchildren's lives and are interested in thinking and learning about children along with Jodie and Eamon.

The Watkins/McLaughlin household is busy, at times hectic, but generally lively and happy. Jodie and Graham talk on the telephone a lot about their children and how they parent them. All three 'parents' come from very different family backgrounds and believe in talking about and sharing their experiences and cultures to enrich their children's lives.

Jodie's parents are English and originally from London. Jodie is a confident parent; she played a significant role in the care of her four younger brothers and also has six nephews and nieces.

Eamon is from County Antrim in Northern Ireland and Jodie met him after he moved to the Birkenhead area for work. They have been together a couple of years.

Graham has lived in and around Birkenhead all of his life. However, as his parents were Nigerian, he is keen that Daisy and Ryan are positive about their Nigerian background. He sees Rosalind as very important to this as his parents are dead and he has no other Nigerian relatives in the country.
