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choosing a subject.

If your child has ambitions of a particular career, then it's likely they'll need to study a specific degree to help them achieve it.

You can help your child to research which universities offer these courses - use the UCAS website (www.ucas.com) to search for courses, view course details on individual university websites and request some prospectuses.

Even if they haven't fully decided on a career yet, this shouldn't stop them from pursuing a subject that they are passionate about.

Parental encouragement is key here - it can be all too easy to dismiss your child's desire to study something that might not lead to an obvious profession; instead focus on the knowledge and skills that will be developed and could open up a whole host of opportunities. It is important that they start to consider their options as early as possible, and you can help by discussing their next steps with them.

Do they want to study:

- A particular subject in more depth
- A subject related to a career
- A completely new subject

In choosing what to study, you might want to ask your child:

- What subjects will you be interested in for a further three of four years?
- What do you want to do after university and could your subject choice help with this?
- What courses accept the subjects you're currently studying?

Whatever their decision, we've got a huge choice of subjects to choose from across a host of routes (foundation, undergraduate, postgraduate), with both part and full-time pathways, making university the perfect opportunity to study something they love or are interested in.



applying to University.

completing a UCAS application.

The university application process can be daunting for your child – but it can be just as overwhelming for parents who, although want to be supportive, may not be entirely sure how the process works. We are here to help.

If your child is applying to university, then the official Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) application process will begin in the autumn when they are in Year 13.

However, it's worth starting to think about things a little earlier than this, as you will need time to discuss their options i.e. what careers are they interested in, what courses are on offer to support this and where they'd like to study.

If your child has decided that University is right for them, here is what they'll need to know:

- All applications are completed electronically via the UCAS website.
 There is a small application fee to pay, the cost of which will differ depending on whether they are applying for one or multiple courses
- Students have a maximum of five choices (these can be the same course at different institutions or multiple courses at the same institution)
- One application is submitted to all five choices
- At this stage they don't need to rank their choices in order of preference
- Each university only sees the application made to them, they won't know which other institutions a student has applied to.

entry requirements.

Each programme of study will stipulate entry requirements for that course. These may be stated as a UCAS tariff point requirement (ie, 112 UCAS tariff points) or as specific grade requirements (ie, grades BBC at A-Level).

Traditional A-level routes aren't the only way to access higher education though—BTEC Diplomas, Access courses and even work/life experience can provide alternative routes in.

To help calculate what grades are needed to get onto a particular course, visit ucas.com/ucas/tariff-calculator.

Many of our programmes offer a foundation year for those students who do not quite meet the requirements for an honours degree.

A foundation year could also be the right choice for applicants who've been out of education for a while or are looking for a new challenge by embarking on a new career path. wgu.ac.uk/foundation

Helping with the application

Applications are all done online via UCAS (ucas.com), so it's worth familiarising yourself with their website, and making a note of the various dates and deadlines. There are four key sections to the application: personal details, education, personal statement and references.

The key section is the personal statement, as this provides an opportunity to demonstrate why they are the perfect candidate for the degree course they are applying for. Please note that your child's school/college will have their own deadlines to give them time to write the references.

Once the application form has been submitted, a notification of receipt will be received from UCAS and they will then forward the application on to the relevant Universities

Admissions tutors will consider the whole application, not just the results or predicted results, so this will include the information given in the personal statement and the reference.

There are three possible outcomes:

Conditional offer - This means the place will be confirmed if certain conditions are met, usually specific grades. Unconditional offer - Entry requirements have been met, and nothing further needs to be done before being accepted on to the course.

Unsuccessful or rejected - Entry requirements have not been met and a place has not been offered. A reason is usually provided, but the University admissions team will be able to provide further information if required.

If your child hasn't received any offers, didn't get the grades they were expecting or are too late to apply through the normal channels, then clearing is the final option. Applicants can approach universities directly for a place on courses where there is still availability.



student finance.

The costs associated with university can be a major worry for parents and students but there is funding available which is designed to allow higher education to be accessible to all.

Student Loans

All students who plan to study at university in the UK can apply for a student loan through the Student Loans Company (slc.co.uk).

Key Facts:

- Students will only start paying anything back after they leave university, if they are working and earn at least £25,725* per year, £2,144 a month or £495 a week
- The amount that is paid once a student earns over the threshold is a fixed rate of 9% of income above the threshold
- If a student stops earning or their income drops below the threshold their payments will stop



- Eligibility for a loan to cover course fees isn't affected by the amount parents earn and should be accessible to most students who haven't already done a degree
- The debt doesn't pass on to anyone else.

Maintenance Grants and Loans

A student loan can cover more than your child's tuition fees. They could also qualify for a maintenance loan to help them to cover their living costs, such as accommodation.

The amount of maintenance loan they get depends on where they study and your household income.

Your child may also be able to get additional help depending on their circumstances, for example if they pay for childcare, have an adult who depends on them financially, or have a disability. Some of this may come in the form of grants, which they won't have to pay back.

If your child is from Wales, they could also benefit from the new student finance package from the Welsh Government, which provides the equivalent to the National Living Wage through a mix of non-repayable grants and loans.
