



Someone brought the salt and herbs and in they went. After a while, the traveller tried a spoonful.


"Mmmm! This tastes wonderful. It's ready to eat now."

"Imagine that! Delicious soup from a stone!" the villagers said to each other. "I wish we had a stone like that."







Beekeeping



Beekeeping has become very popular in Zimbabwe. It is a good way to earn some extra money. This is because it is not very difficult or expensive to start keeping bees. First, you need to build some hives for the bees to live in. Then you need to get a swarm of bees. Some people find a wild swarm of bees in a tree. If you cannot find a wild swarm, you can buy some bees from another beekeeper. After a few months, you can start selling honey from your hives.

Mufaro lives with his aunt. His aunt started keeping bees three years ago. She started with one hive, but now she has four hives. She built the hives herself, and Mufaro helped her. She sells the honey to people in her village. She also sells candles made from the beeswax. Keeping bees only takes a few hours each week of her time. She still has plenty for time for her main job, which is growing fruit trees.

At first, Mufaro was worried about getting stung by the bees, but this has not been a problem. In three years, he has only been stung once.


Beekeeping is also good for the environment. To make honey, bees need the flowers in trees. This means that beekeepers look after the trees in their area, instead of cutting them down for firewood.

What is rock art?

They are very old paintings in caves and under rock shelves.

How old are they?

The paintings are between 2,000 and 10,000 years old.

Who made Zimbabwe's rock art?

The San people painted most of them. They were some of the first people in southern Africa. They hunted and looked for fruit, roots and leaves to eat.

What did they use as paint?

The San people made the paint from rocks. They found different coloured rocks, and they ground them to make powder. Then they added animal fat, to make a paste. They made white, yellow, orange, purple, red, grey, brown and black colours.

Did they have paint brushes?

They mostly used sticks or fingers to paint, but they also sometimes tied animal hair to the sticks to paint small details.

What did they paint?

They painted lots of different animals: antelope, elephants zebras, porcupines, rhinos, warthogs and giraffes. They also painted men, women and children. The people in the pictures often have bows and arrows.


Why did they paint them?

They believed that the paintings helped them to hunt better. It was very important for them to catch food for everyone to eat.

"That's right" said Hlengiwe. "We'll make lots of money and then we can start our own chicken farm."


"We will build a new bigger house for us all to live in, with the money from the chicken farm," said Themba, feeling excited.
