

## Using English in Everyday Life

When the Block Education Officer directed me to the TESS-India OER on the SCERT website, I selected Secondary English OER, 'Supporting speaking in English: pair and groupwork' and started to work through it.



It was reassuring to see students engaged in such activities in the videos on pair work and groupwork.



The first activity I tried out with my students was a simple **pair dictation activity** from the OER.



My students worked in pairs, with one dictating and the other writing. As I listened to their conversations, I noticed some common pronunciation issues. Having noted them down, I drew everyone's attention to them at the end of the activity.



I accessed another Secondary English OER, 'Building your students' confidence to speak English', and I have been involving my students in choosing some interesting topics for discussion.



I keep a copy of the '**Using pair work**' key resource on my desk, as it is a helpful reminder of the different ways in which I can use this approach with my class.

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
